You continue to help Queensland's flood victims through their long journey of recovery.



Then floods devastated families across Southeast Queensland in February 2022, Vinnies volunteers and staff sprang into action. While we are not a first responder organisation, Vinnies was able to deliver vital assistance, quickly, through our network of volunteer members who live on the ground in flood-impacted communities.

One year on and more than \$1.5 million in assistance has been delivered to 1644 individuals, including 600 families. Much of this support has been rolled out across Ipswich, Oxley, Caboolture and Gympie, where the devastation was particularly intense and widespread. We know from experience that we will still be helping people for many months to come.

The life-changing gift of education

Sarah's + children are thriving in and out of the classroom - thanks to you.

hen Sarah fled her violent ex-husband back in 2012, she was left living in her car while trying to care for two young children.

"When I got my tooth knocked out, I had no choice but to leave," Sarah remembers. "My ex had taken all my money, which made it hard to feed my kids."

Sarah struggled for two long years to make ends meet and provide a safe home for her children before meeting local Vinnies volunteer, Cheryl. With support from Vinnies' Children's Education Fund – and wonderful people like you – Cheryl has been able to help Sarah put life back together for her family and give her kids the best start at school.

"Cheryl has been amazing," Sarah says. "Early on she helped me a lot with food parcels and gift cards to buy groceries."

"She also helped me get the support I needed to pay for the kids' education. That meant the world to me."

Life continues to be a challenge for Sarah. These days she juggles the

demands of caring full time for her mother while raising three children on her own. Rising cost-of-living pressures have made the balancing act even more difficult.

"It's hard every year, but especially this year," Sarah says, "I haven't got two cents to rub together. If I can't even afford my groceries, how am I supposed to buy uniforms and everything else the kids need for school."

Support through our Children's Education Fund is vital to helping Sarah give her children the opportunity to achieve their amazing potential.



"I'm so proud of my kids. They're doing so well. My eldest Talia is doing extension programs for gifted and intelligent students. My middle child Maddie is representing her college at chess. And my youngest Daniel is doing really well with his maths, music and reading.

"Without the help we get through the Fund, they wouldn't be getting those opportunities."

Thank you for helping to give promising young people the chance to shine bright – and preventing them from falling into a cycle of poverty and homelessness.

Champions for Children

Volunteer groups are going above and beyond to help kids thrive at school.

Vinnies volunteer members far and wide are helping kids from every corner of Queensland. And when it comes to giving disadvantaged children the opportunity to succeed in the classroom, volunteers in regional areas are at the top of the class.

In the last year alone, Gympie volunteers helped 190 children with \$39,737 in school expenses. Caboolture volunteers helped 119 children with \$24,454. Through their tireless efforts, these hardworking groups have helped change countless young lives and empower them with education.

What is Vinnies Children's Education Fund?

Removing the barriers to education for some of Queensland's most disadvantaged kids – thanks to you!

Every child in Queensland deserves an equal opportunity to get an education and the best start in life. But with cost-of-living pressures growing, more and more parents are facing impossible choices between putting food on the table, paying the rent and paying for their children's education.

Household Expenditure Data* released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics shows there has been a 43% increase in average household spend on education over the last decade. On average, Aussie parents will spend \$571 for a primary student and \$771 for a secondary student to send their kids to school this year. Total education costs for 2023 are predicted to average \$2325 for a primary student and \$4212 for a secondary student**.


That means the need to support disadvantaged kids with their education has never been greater.


The Children's Education Fund was set up in 2006 and provides financial support to students and families across Queensland for back-to-school expenses like uniforms, books, stationery, iPads, computers and other resources for the new school year. Last year, with the support of wonderful people like you, Vinnies provided \$974,463*** to support 3,997 disadvantaged children with their education.

Celebrating lifelong learning

Vinnies volunteer Gita is engaging vulnerable women to sew and fostering community connection.

hen Gita noticed that refugee women in her community were looking for opportunities for social interaction and companionship, she decided to do something about it. She started by picking up her needle and thread.

Gita set up a sewing group for migrant and refugee women in Toowoomba. The classes gave the women, most of whom came from various war-torn countries speaking different languages, the opportunity. to learn new skills, practise their English – and most importantly, socialise.

Gita quickly realised the group was about much more than sewing.

"One day I noticed the energy levels were particularly high and the women were frantically conversing in their mother tongue. I sensed something wasn't right," she says.

"It turned out something had happened back in their home country. I said to my colleague, 'we might not get much sewing done today, so let's just make them cups of tea and let the ladies talk.""

Inspired by the success of the Darling Heights Learn to Sew Group, around 7 years ago, Gita went on to provide the same

opportunity at Harlaxton and Newtown Schools. She also had a delightful 'Mothers & Daughters' group at Harristown High that encouraged practising English skills along with sewing. Gita started another class at Range Allied Health, which provides support to people from a refugee background who live with a disability. Melody Shepherd, an occupational therapist and Director of the Centre, says Gita's classes have given her clients a valuable opportunity to develop new skills and work towards their goals.

"Some of the women have an ambition to create their own small businesses by selling their creations. Others are participating with a goal to learn basic sewing skills and practice their social skills."

Gita also now runs a 'Sew and Chat' group at St Anthony's Church in Harristown, which brings together women from all backgrounds, cultures and walks of life to support each other while learning new sewing skills.

With your kind support, Vinnies has been able to assist Gita by providing new Janome sewing machines to use in her classes. Thank you for helping foster life-long learning and empowering women to build their lives with new skills.

A pathway out of homelessness

The Toowoomba Shelter has been helping men get back on their feet and into a home.

n the last year alone, Vinnies has provided more than 100,000 nights of accommodation to people experiencing or at risk of homelessness. One of the ways we do this is through hostels like Toowoomba Shelter, where up to 14 men at any one time can stay for up to three months while they get the support that they need to get their lives back on track.

Serving the community for more than 40 years, Toowoomba Shelter is operated by a dedicated team of staff and volunteers. Ron Burgess (pictured below, centre) is the Manager at the Shelter and says a recent client's story reminded him why the service continues to play such an important role in Vinnies' homelessness response.

"The client had recently got out of prison and wanted to make use of our support services to put his life back together. With our help he was able to find a room in a share house and successfully re-sit the test for his driver's license. He's also now volunteering at a community kitchen where he's cooking meals for the homeless."

Responding to a problem as systemic and deeply ingrained as homelessness requires innovation and collaboration. That is why we operate the Immediate
Housing Response
Service from our base
at Toowoomba Shelter.
Working in collaboration
with the Queensland
Government through this
service, we get families who
are in immediate crisis,
sleeping in their cars and
tents, into motels.

We also offer 15 homes to families in crisis for short-term emergency accommodation as part of the Toowoomba Family Accommodation Program.

This would not have been possible without the generosity of wonderful supporters like you. Thank you for helping us continue to lead the way with innovative solutions to homelessness.

Towards 500 homes with your support

You are driving holistic solutions to homelessness across Queensland.

dvocating to government to build more homes is another key strategy Vinnies uses to tackle homelessness.

We were delighted to be invited to participate in a recent housing summit held by the Queensland Government, where we shared the experiences of those facing homelessness. We also submitted applications for funding to continue working towards our objective to build 500 new homes. So far, we have secured land to build homes and have submitted plans to government requesting funding and support.

Also, as a result of our lobbying efforts, the government has announced a funding increase of \$1 billion into their housing fund. As part of the Queensland Government's Housing Summit, it also announced a further \$56m investment including \$12m for rental support and \$10m towards emergency accommodation. While we welcome this commitment, we will continue to advocate for more action and funding – and more innovative solutions – to address the housing crisis.

These include:

Short-term initiatives
to expedite funding and commencement of house building projects
to work with local councils to review social and affordable housing quotas and release land
to expand rent subsidies to keep people housed
to develop partnerships with homelessness service providers to repurpose existing infrastructure like hotels and student accommodation into housing
to approve a housing pathway plan for people released from institutions
to establish a Housing Market Helpline
Longer-term initiatives
to continue to advocate to the State Government to commit to developing 50,000 social and affordable homes over the next 10 years (5,000 per year)
to work with the Federal Government to request greater funding and support through the Housing Future Fund, with the aim of achieving a cohesive national approach to the housing crisis in our country
to work with the Federal Government to provide tax incentives for builders who build or refurbish properties for social housing or crisis accommodation

Future leaders sleep out for homelessness

What did you learn of the Ozanam Leadership Program participants?

That the future looks bright. These kids are ready to lead us to great things. They think differently than my generation in so many great ways. There is a lot to learn from them.

What impressed you most about the young people?

They asked a lot of questions about leaving a lasting impact on people and this world. The fact that they care so much about that made me realise I need to put more emphasis on what I'm doing to make tomorrow better.

What was the most challenging question the kids asked of the panel?

What are you doing to give the less-advantaged opportunities? We

all agreed, there is an opportunity for us to do more.

How is the CEO Sleepout an expression of your leadership?

Personally, it's allowed me to show my team and community that regardless of where you are in your life, you can find time for your community.

What are you most looking forward to at next year's CEO Sleepout?

Continuing to share everything I've learned around homelessness in QLD with my community. I feel like if I can continue to share what I know to help make a change, then the growth of the CEO Sleepout and money raised will happen organically. Seeing that come to life is exciting.

Tomorrow's leaders put their advocacy and faith into action.

n August 2022, 35 Queensland students slept rough for the night to help raise awareness and advocate for those experiencing homelessness as part of Vinnies' Ozanam Leadership Program. This program aims to develop 15 and 16-year-old students into compassionate servant leaders in their communities.

2022 was the first time our Ozanam Leadership Program students participated in the CEO Sleepout. As part of the program, participants heard from an advocacy panel featuring four CEO Sleepout Ambassadors. They also got the opportunity to quiz the ambassadors on the importance of compassionate leadership in overcoming big challenges like homelessness.

IGA supports Vinnies again this Christmas.


e're delighted to have partnered with IGA for the 10th consecutive year to help Australians struggling over Christmas last year.
