LITERAL QUESTIONS

How could Australia save \$626 million every year?

Australia could save \$626 million every year by investing in early intervention for youth justice and health costs for homeless youth.

What is the main cost of youth homelessness to society?

The statement "homelessness doesn't have a postcode" means that homelessness does not just occur in visible areas like the inner city. Homelessness is an issue that occurs in almost every suburb across the country in one form or another.

Is the article presenting a positive or negative view of people experiencing homelessness? How can you tell?
